SETTING THE SCENE

For the third time in four duals, Lehigh will face a top-five opponent as the 16th-ranked Mountain Hawks close out the fall semester against No. 4 Iowa at storied Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Lehigh is winless in its first three duals for the first time in 11 years but the Mountain Hawks have already faced No. 5 Michigan and No. 1 Penn State. Last weekend, a shorthanded Lehigh squad was edged by Princeton 21-19 before being blanked by the top-ranked Nittany Lions. The Mountain Hawks will be looking to head into the final exam break on a positive note against an Iowa team that Lehigh has never beaten. The Hawkeyes are one of the most storied programs in college wrestling history and are off to a 5-0 dual start this season.

FAST FACTS

- In the last eight seasons, Lehigh has produced two NCAA champions, seven NCAA finalists, 22 All-Americans and 18 EIWA champions.
- Iowa is one of seven teams Lehigh has wrestled, but never beaten in a dual meet but the only one of the seven that Lehigh wrestled more than twice.
- Lehigh is 18-11 in dual meets against current Big Ten members (excluding rival Penn State) under Pat Santoro.
- Competing against one of the nation's toughest schedules, Lehigh is 0-3 in duals for the first time since the 2007-08 team started 0-4.

IOWA 31, LEHIGH 6**

No. 21 Lehigh and No. 3 Iowa were knotted at 6-6 after four bouts but the visiting Hawkeyes swept the final six matches, scoring bonus points in four en route to a 31-6 win over the Mountain Hawks at Stabler Arena. Iowa made its first trip to Bethlehem in nearly 24 years and posted three technical falls and a major decision to defeat Lehigh in its final home dual. Sophomore Laike Gardner and freshman Mitch Minotti posted wins for the Mountain Hawks, with Gardner winning a 5-3 decision over Josh Dziewa at 141 and Minotti beating Michael Kelly 4-1 at 149. Derek St. John gave the Hawkeyes the lead for good with a technical fall win over Mike Stepien at 157.

LEHIGH HEAD COACH PAT SANTORO

The 2018 EIWA and NWCA National Coach of the Year, Pat Santoro is in his 11th season as the Lawrence White '64 Head Coach of Wrestling at Lehigh. In 10 seasons Santoro, now a four-time EIWA Coach of the Year, has led the Mountain Hawks to a 135-47-1 dual meet record. He has coached 16 individuals to a total of 21 EIWA titles, 12 Mountain Hawks to a total of 23 All-American medals, and two national champions, Zach Rey in 2011 and Darian Cruz in 2017. A former Lehigh assistant, Santoro returned to Bethlehem in 2008 after a five-year stint resurrecting the program at Maryland, where he guided the Terrapins to an ACC title in 2008. A 1992 graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, Santoro won a pair of NCAA titles and is the Panthers' only four-time All-American. *(For Santoro's complete bio, see page eight)*

RANK AND FILE

Five wrestlers appear in the latest InterMat rankings, with the trio of senior Ryan Preisch, junior Jordan Kutler and sophomore Jordan Wood all coming in at No. 6 in their respective weight classes. Lehigh also has eight wrestlers ranked by FloWrestling, six by Amateur Wrestling News and five by The Open Mat. Freshman Josh Humphreys entered FloWrestling's rankings at 157 after making his dual debut last weekend. Kutler, Preisch, sophomore Jake Jakobsen and Wood are ranked across the board for Lehigh at the final four weight classes.

SERIES HISTORY

Lehigh and Iowa meet for the 26th time overall and the first time since February 2014. The Mountain Hawks last wrestled Iowa in Iowa in December 2012. Lehigh has dropped the previous 25 duals against Iowa including all 13 duals contested in Iowa. Lehigh and Iowa once met in 21 consecutive seasons from 1972 to 1992. Iowa is one of seven schools that Lehigh owns zero all-time dual wins against, but it is the only school in the group that Lehigh has wrestled more than two times.

FRESH FACE IN THE LINEUP

True freshman Josh Humphreys made his official Lehigh debut at 157 last weekend, picking up a hard-fought 5-4 decision over Princeton's Quincy Monday on Friday before battling top-ranked Jason Nolf of Penn State before losing by fall via a third-period cradle. Humphreys, a four-time state champion from Parkersburg, W. Va., became the first true freshman to compete in duals for the Mountain Hawks since Kyle Gentile and Joe Lobeck during the 2016-17 season. Humphreys competed unattached at the Nov. 11 Jonathan Kaloust Bearcat Open, officially going 4-0 with two falls and two wins over former EIWA finalists to claim the 157-pound title.

THINGS THAT HAVEN'T HAPPENED IN A WHILE

Last weekend the Mountain Hawks found themselves on the wrong end of a couple of instances that had not occurred in quite some time. Lehigh's loss to Princeton was its first against the Tigers since January 1968 and snapped a 14-dual winning streak in the series for the Brown and White. The short-handed Mountain Hawks failed to win a match Sunday at No. 1 Penn State, marking the first time they were shut out since falling 33-0 to the Nittany Lions at Stabler Arena in December 2007.

IOWA UNKIND

Lehigh has not had a great deal of success in duals in the state of Iowa, winning just twice in 19 road dual meets against Iowa, Iowa State, Northern Iowa and Cornell College. The Mountain Hawks posted a 40-0 win at Cornell College in 1972 and also won 21-12 at Iowa State in 2002. Lehigh is 0-14 all-time versus Iowa in Iowa City. Lehigh last visited Iowa for a dual meet in December 2012 and before that in the 2002-03 season. Iowa hosted the 2015 NWCA National Duals, where Lehigh upset eventual national champion Ohio State as part of a 1-2 showing, but did not face the host Hawkeyes.

DUAL DEBUTS

A Lehigh lineup that was expected to be veteran-laden heading into the season has had a much different look thus far due to injuries. Six Mountain Hawks have made their varsity dual debuts this season. Sophomore Brandon Paetzell (133), junior Ryan Pomrinca (141) and freshman Jimmy Hoffman (149) have competed in all three duals, plus the Journeymen Collegiate Classic. Paetzell made his Lehigh dual debut after going 6-5 for Rutgers in duals in 2016-17. All three Mountain Hawks are 1-2 in dual action this season, with Hoffman winning by injury default against Michigan and Paetzell and Pomrinca posting wins versus Princeton. Deferred freshman Luke Resnick (125) and true freshman Josh Humphreys (157) made their first career dual appearances against Princeton, while sophomore Trey Cornish (165) made his debut against Penn State. Another deferred freshman, Dan Moran, competed at the Princeton Open and Journeymen Collegiate Classic at 141, but has yet to compete in a dual meet for the Mountain Hawks this season.

SCOUTING THE HAWKEYES

One of college wrestling's most storied programs, Iowa has won 23 national championships and 35 Big Ten titles. The Hawkeyes have won their first five duals to start the season, including a narrow 19-18 triumph over rival Iowa State on Dec. 1. Iowa also owns dual wins over Cal State Bakersfield, Kent State, Princeton and Purdue. Iowa's projected lineup features ranked wrestlers at nine weight classes, including a pair of No. 1-ranked grapplers. Spencer Lee is the defending NCAA champion at 125, while heavyweight Sam Stoll is also ranked first. Alex Marinelli (165), Jacob Warner (197) and Kaleb Young (157) are all ranked in the top 10 at their respective weights. The Hawkeyes have four Pennsylvania products listed among their 14 probables. Iowa also has two notable transfers in Austin DeSanto (Drexel) at 133 and Pat Lugo (Edinboro) at 149. Tom Brands is in his 13th season as Iowa's head coach.

A CORE FOUR OF RETURNING CHAMPIONS

Lehigh crowned five individual EIWA champions last March on the way to its 35th EIWA team title and its first since 2006. Four of the five champions return for the Mountain Hawks this season. Senior Scott Parker has won back-to-back titles at 133 and is a two-time All-American but has not yet competed this season. Junior Jordan Kutler won his first title and earned All-America honors at 174. Senior Ryan Preisch clinched the team title for the Mountain Hawks with a fall in the finals at 184 and earned the Coaches Trophy as the tournament's Outstanding Wrestler. Sophomore heavyweight Jordan Wood became the first Lehigh freshman EIWA champion since Randy Cruz in 2013.

LEHIGH AGAINST THE TOP FIVE

Lehigh will be facing its third top-five ranked opponent of the early season when the Mountain Hawks face Iowa. Last season's win over No. 4 Michigan was Lehigh's third over a top-five opponent under Pat Santoro. The Mountain Hawks also topped No. 1 Cornell in 2010-11 and No. 3 Ohio State in 2014-15. The win over Ohio State was part of the NWCA National Duals and was contested in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

BEEN THROUGH IT BEFORE

Lehigh's roster features a solid mix of experience and young talent. While the Mountain Hawks have 16 freshmen (deferred and true combined) on their 2018-19 roster, Lehigh also features a pair of returning All-Americans and EIWA Champions in Scott Parker and Jordan Kutler and a total of 10 wrestlers who have qualified for the NCAA Championships at least once. Lehigh added another experienced wrestler in graduate transfer Connor Schram, who was a 2016 All-American and Pac-12 champion at Stanford.

LOTS OF LOCALS

Several Lehigh wrestlers didn't have to venture far from home to wrestle collegiately for the Brown and White. Sophomore Luke Karam both wrestled for nearby Bethlehem Catholic High School, the same program that produced Lehigh head coach Pat Santoro. Junior Charlie Sell (Bangor) and freshman Dan Moran (Northampton) are also from the wrestling-rich Lehigh Valley. Sophomore Jake Jakobsen hails from Stroudsburg, which is part of District XI and three Mountain Hawks: junior Scott Parker, sophomore Kyle Gentile and freshman Matt Parker wrestled for Pennridge High School, which is located just south of the Lehigh Valley. Sophomore Brandon Paetzell and freshman Brian Meyer hail from Phillipsburg, N.J., just across the state line.

DRIVE FOR FIVE

Lehigh's roster features six fifth-year seniors, including four who have already earned their undergraduate degrees. Three Mountain Hawks: Ryan Preisch (Environmental Engineering), Ian Brown (Chemical Engineering) and Brandon Diaz (Philosophy), are pursuing Master's degrees in Management. Gordon Wolf is pursuing a Master's in Applied Economics after earning a Finance degree. Connor Schram received a sixth year of eligibility and is pursuing graduate work in Educational Leadership.

FROM COAST TO COAST

Lehigh prides itself in bringing in student-athletes from across the nation. This season, eight different states are represented among the 45 men on the Mountain Hawks' roster. Pennsylvania leads the way with 29 wrestlers, followed by New Jersey (9) and New York (2). California, Michigan, North Carolina, Tennessee and West Virginia are also represented.

FAMILY TIES

Lehigh's roster features several wrestlers with noteworthy family connections. True freshman Jaret Lane joins older brother Kent, a fourth-year junior, in the latest line of brothers to suit up for the Brown and White in recent years. Senior Cortlandt Schuyler's father Pete '83 won two EIWA titles for Lehigh and earned All-America honors with a third place finish at 134 in 1983.

THINKING B1G

In addition to its third top-five opponent of the early season, Lehigh will be facing its third Big Ten opponent in four duals when the Mountain Hawks travel to Iowa. Lehigh has wrestled a total of 40 duals against current Big Ten members in Pat Santoro's 10-plus seasons as head coach. The Mountain Hawks are 20-20 in duals against current Big Ten foes since the start of the 2008-09 season and 18-11 if you exclude Penn State, which was an old rival of the Brown and White long before the Nittany Lions joined the Big Ten. Over the last 10-plus seasons, Lehigh has faced every Big Ten member with the exceptions of Indiana, Michigan State and Wisconsin. Lehigh has had the most recent success against Rutgers, going 6-2 against the Scarlet Knights, but the Mountain Hawks also own four wins against Michigan.

TOURNAMENT TESTED

Lehigh has sent wrestlers to the Princeton Open and the Jonathan Kaloust Bearcat Open over the season's first two weekends, with two Mountain Hawks placing top six at Princeton and three placing top six at Binghamton. Freshman Josh Humphreys won the title at 157 at Binghamton, going 5-0 with wins over two former EIWA finalists. Junior Chase Gallik reached the finals at 174 to lead the Lehigh contingent at Princeton.

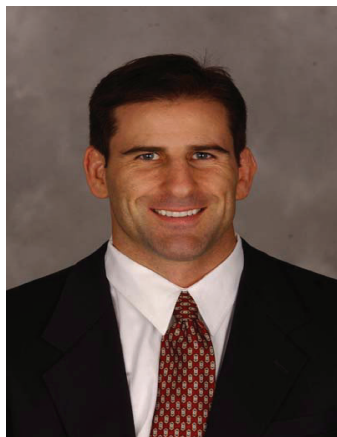

LAWRENCE WHITE HEAD COACH - PAT SANTORO



Bethlehem native Pat Santoro enters his 11th season as the Lawrence White Head Coach of Wrestling at Lehigh.

A four-time EIWA Coach of the Year, Santoro has mentored two NCAA Champions at Lehigh. He has led 16 individuals to a total of 21 EIWA titles, while guiding 12 men to 23 total All-American medals.

Santoro led Lehigh to its 35th EIWA team title and first since 2006 with an impressive 164.5 point performance in 2018. The Mountain Hawks crowned five individual EIWA champions and had all 10 wrestlers earn berths for the NCAA Championships. After leading Lehigh to its first league title in 12 seasons, Santoro was named EIWA Coach of the Year for the fourth time. He also led Lehigh to a top 10 dual meet finish.

Prior to the NCAA Tournament, Santoro was named NWCA National Coach of the Year, for Lehigh's performance during the dual season and EIWA Tournament. At NCAAs, Santoro's Lehigh team produced three All-Americans, with Darian Cruz becoming a three-time All-American, Scott Parker earning his second medal and Jordan Kutler reaching the podium for the first time.

Darian Cruz's national title capped a successful campaign for the Mountain Hawks in 2016-17. Lehigh went 10-4 in duals and competed in the NWCA National Duals Championship Series for the second consecutive season, avenging a loss to Rutgers a year prior with a 23-10 win. Darian Cruz and Scott Parker won individual EIWA titles at the first two weights and both wrestlers went on to earn All-America honors, with Parker finishing eighth at 133 in addition to Cruz's national title.

Santoro earned his third EIWA Coach of the Year award in 2015-16. He led the Mountain Hawks to a 13-3 dual record that included Lehigh's first win over rival Cornell since 2011. The Mountain Hawks finished second at the EIWA Championships with Darian Cruz and Max Wessell winning their first career titles.

Lehigh crowned three All-Americans at the NCAA Championships for the third straight year with Wessell and Randy Cruz earning their first career All-America medals, while Nathaniel Brown became a two-time All-American.

In 2014-15, Santoro earned his 100th victory as Lehigh's head coach when the Mountain Hawks upset eventual NCAA Champion Ohio State at National Duals.

Lehigh's lineup featured just two seniors but a strong core of sophomores and juniors continued to impress. Randy Cruz won his second EIWA title to help lead Lehigh to a second place conference finish. Nathaniel Brown reached the NCAA finals at 184 while Mason Beckman and Mitch Minotti earned All-America honors for the second straight year.

Santoro led the 2013-14 Lehigh squad through the ups and downs that come with a young roster. The young Mountain Hawks soared at the NCAA Championships with freshmen Darian Cruz and Minotti joining Beckman in earning All-America honors.

In 2012-13, Santoro helped guide a young Mountain Hawk team to ten dual meet wins. Three individuals won individual EIWA titles. Under Santoro's guidance Robert Hamlin became Lehigh's 16th three-time All-American and reached the NCAA finals for the second time in his career.

Lehigh continued to make strides in 2011-12. The Mountain Hawks finished eighth at the NCAA Championships for the second straight year and once again had two finalists in Zach Rey and Brandon Hatchett. Lehigh crowned four All-Americans. Robert Hamlin won his second straight EIWA title, while Hatchett won his first. Shane Welsh was the surprise of the tournament, capturing the title at 149 from the No. 6 seed. Lehigh's three championships were its most since 2006. For his efforts, Santoro was voted EIWA Coach of the Year for the second time.

In Santoro's third season Lehigh returned to the top ten at the NCAA Championships for the first time since 2006 with an eighth place finish. The Mountain Hawks crowned three All-Americans for the first time in five years and placed two wrestlers in the NCAA finals for the first time since 2003. Heavyweight Zach Rey became Santoro's first national champion.

In 2009-10, Santoro guided the Mountain Hawks to a 16-3-1 dual record and a top-ten national dual meet ranking for most of the season. In March, Santoro guided Rey to an EIWA title and All-America honors with a third place finish at the NCAA Championships, the program's first All-American in four years.

Santoro produced an immediate turnaround in his first season back in Bethlehem. The Mountain Hawks' 23-1 dual mark surpassed the school record for dual wins in a season. Santoro guided Seth Ciasulli and Da-

vid Craig to individual EIWA Championships.

Before returning to Lehigh, Santoro spent five years as the head coach at the University of Maryland where he helped resurrect the Terrapins program, which in 2008 captured its first ACC title in 35 years; a feat which earned Santoro ACC Coach of the Year honors.

Prior to his stint at Maryland Santoro served as an assistant at Lehigh for nine years, including eight Greg Strobel's staff. During that time, Santoro was part of some of the most successful teams in school history. In 2003, Santoro was named the national Assistant Coach of the Year by the National Wrestling Coaches Association, after helping guide Lehigh to its third EIWA title in four years, and a fourth place finish at the NCAA Championships.

Before coming to Lehigh, Santoro spent one season as an assistant at Duquesne and two as a graduate assistant at Penn State.

Santoro has enjoyed success at every level of wrestling, both as a coach and a competitor. After wrestling for Bethlehem Catholic High School and taking a post-graduate year at Blair Academy, Santoro wrestled collegiately at Pittsburgh, where he became the Panthers' only four-time All-America while capturing national titles in 1988 and 1989 at 142 pounds.

On the international scene, Santoro was a four time member of the U.S. National Team between 1995 and 1999 and served as an alternate for the 1996 Olympic Team and the 1999 World Team. Santoro earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Pittsburgh in 1992. In addition to his Bethlehem roots and previous coaching stint at Lehigh, Santoro's father, uncle and brother all wrestled for the Brown and White.

Santoro and his wife Julie have a daughter, Leah and a son, Mack.
